A Tribute to Dorothy Thwaite

Many of us in Waterhouses remember Dorothy with much affection, although she moved from our village two years ago to live nearer her family. She was born in Herrington, Co. Durham in 1923 and it was soon seen to be very talented, not just academically but in sports and music. Dorothy had a beautiful contralto voice and, but for her wish to be a nurse, might have made a career in opera. Whilst still at grammar school she met her husband to be, Leslie.

After training in Newcastle as a nurse Dorothy worked both there and in London. Following her marriage she and Leslie lived in the north east, and it was there that their children, David and Victoria were born, in 1948 and 1951 respectively. Always enterprising, Dorothy trained in Sunderland as a teacher so that she could work as well as look after the family.

A career change for Leslie meant the family moving to Cheshire in 1961. There Dorothy continued to teach spending a long time in special education where she worked with teenagers, many of whom were from deprived backgrounds. In the early 70's she decided she would like to go back to what she considered her true vocation and was successful in gaining a position as Sister Tutor at Manchester Royal Infirmary. There she was able to combine teaching and nursing by training the new generation of nurses in the school of nursing.

When the grandchildren came along, in 1978 and 1983 she was in her element, loving to spend time with them and being dearly loved in return.

Dorothy retired in the early 80s and when Leslie also retired they moved back home to County Durham and settled in the bungalow in Waterhouses. Here Dorothy could indulge her interest in all aspects of nature, creating a lovely garden and welcoming birds and other wildlife. They soon got involved in our village affairs, with Leslie taking a lead role in acquiring lottery funding to turn the abandoned old coop building into the Village Community Hall. Sadly he died in 1999 but Dorothy continued her active role in the village association activities and was one of four ladies representing the association at a Garden Party in Buckingham Palace in 2005. She always loved to travel, both in Europe and in the UK, and in later years enjoyed holidaying in Scotland with Brian and Anne Pears and her old friend, Ivey Gardner.

We were sad to say goodbye to her when she moved back to Cheshire but we are left with many happy memories of a lovely lady.

CLASSES IN THE SHOW

Vegetables:

- **Children's categories:**
 - Heaviest vegetable
 - Longest carrot
 - Ugliest vegetable
 - Funniest head of cress hair (decorated egg-shell or container)
- **Adult's categories:**
 - Three potatoes (same variety)
 - Three carrots
 - Three tomatoes
 - Leek
 - Beetroot
 - Lettuce
 - Three French Beans
 - Three Runner Beans
 - Pumpkin or squash
 - Courgette, cucumber or okra
 - Pepper (any type) including chilli
 - Small bunch of any other salad vegetable (radish, spring onion etc)
 - Small basket or bowl of mixed vegetables

Fruit:

- Three items of pipped fruit (such as apple or pear)
- Three items of stoned fruit (such as plum or peach)
- Small plate of home produced soft fruit (such as raspberry, strawberry etc)

Home Produce:

- Victoria Sponge
- 3 scones (can be any type - plain, fruit, cheese etc)
- Jar of jam (any variety) including lemon curd
- Apple Pie

Craft

- Any craft item (e.g. knitting, crochet, sewing, embroidery, pottery etc) – adult and children's categories
- A 'garden on a plate' - a category for children. A garden to be created on a paper plate using as many ideas/materials as you can!

Flowers:

- **Children's categories**
 - Jam Jar of flowers
- **Adult's categories:**
 - Tallest sunflower – in a pot or in the garden – to be measured in situ – see above concerning entry forms
 - Vase of home grown flowers (of any variety) *One award for the best flowers, and one for the best skill in arrangement.*

All entries should be home grown or home produced
